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1. Don't be a Drifter Herbicide spraying workshops

On the 18/19 February Southern ACT Catchment Group conducted another 'Don't Be A Drifter' herbicide use training course run by Craig Day from 'Spray Safe and Save' at Westwood Farm near Kambah. The course was open to urban landcarers, Park Carers and landholders and managers across the ACT or in the Googong or Upper Murrumbidgee catchments (within 50 km south of the ACT border). Costs were covered through funding to the catchment group from ActewAGL and the ACT NRM Council. 17 people had enrolled for the course but only 13 actually attended. Another course will be organised for the rural community in several months time.

As part of the Australian Government's Caring for our Country initiative, Community Action Grants recognise the contribution that community groups make to the Caring for our Country priority areas of:
